The Crux of the Resurrection – All the claims of Christianity hang on the Resurrection.

The Crux of the Resurrection



Does it really matter if the resurrection of Christ is true or not?

This has been debated throughout the centuries. Even liberal churches today often reject the importance of the resurrection of Christ. Some say the resurrection was simply symbolic. Others state that it refers to the "conscience imagination" of the church in which the memory of Christ is alive in His followers. Non-believers think little of the resurrection and simply content themselves with Easter chocolate, bunnies and dyed eggs, without giving any thought to what the driving force behind Easter might be. For them it is simply commercial. Others know that it is about Christ rising from the dead after being publicly crucified, but they do not connect the truth of the resurrection to their own soul. They blissfully chalk it up as a historical event without any bearing on the present or future.

Let me address three important issues regarding the resurrection of Christ:

1. It was a historical event.

Not only do we read about the eyewitness accounts of it in the Gospels in the New Testament, but even secular history gives record of it. Josephus, the premier Jewish historian writes:

"Now, there was about this time Jesus, a wise man, if it be lawful to call him a man, for he was a doer of wonderful works — a teacher of such men as received the truth with pleasure. He drew men over to him both many of the Jews, and many of the Gentiles. He was [the] Christ; and when Pilate, at the suggestion of the principled men amongst us, had condemned him to the cross, those that loved him at the first did not forsake him, for he appeared to them alive again the third day, as the divine prophets had foretold these and ten thousand other wonderful things concerning him; and the tribe of Christians, so named from him, are not extinct at this day." (The Works of Josephus, The Antiquities of the Jews, Book 18, Chapter 3:63,64)

Even though Josephus was not a Christian, the historical facts of the crucifixion, resurrection, and who Jesus was as The Christ; were so evident, that as a historian, he recorded them as such!

2. The Theological/Spiritual significance of the Resurrection of Christ:

In I Corinthians the Apostle Paul, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, lays out a masterful explanation of the truth and importance of the resurrection of Christ! He begins by noting that there were over 500 eyewitnesses of Christ after His resurrection and that most were still alive at the time of Paul's writing and available to be interviewed! Paul then goes on to explain how the entirety of the Christian faith hangs upon the truth of the resurrection. He states:

"If Christ has not been raised, your faith is worthless; you are still in your sins. Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. If we have hoped in Christ in this life only, we are of all men most to be pitied." (I Cor. 15:17-19)

Without the resurrection, every teaching of Christ's would be for nothing, there would be no atonement for our sins, we would have believed for nothing, and we would all perish in hell, most to be pitied. It there was no resurrection, Christianity would be a farce, and one would be a fool to follow Christ and to depend upon Him for eternal life. It would all be hopeless!

3. But, if the resurrection really happened, then

If the resurrection really did happen, then all of Jesus' claims and teachings are true! And then every intellectually and spiritually honest person must come face to face with those facts and respond. Throughout the centuries, every generation has had "apologists" who stand up and clearly articulate the truth that the entirely of the Christian faith hangs upon the truth of the resurrection of Christ. If it did not happen, Christianity is pointless; but if it did happen, then Christianity must be seriously considered, and the claims of Christ must be understood as absolute truth. In recent history these "apologists" (those who give a defense or reason for the faith) include, John Duncan (*Colloquia Peripatetica*), Watchman Nee (*Normal Christian Faith*), C.S. Lewis (*Mere Christianity*), Josh McDowell (*Evidence Demands A Verdict*), Lee Strobel (*The Case for Christ* and *The Case for Faith*), and many others. I have always been partial to C.S. Lewis' summery quote about Jesus being either "liar, lunatic, or Lord." In *Mere Christianity*, Lewis writes,

"I am trying here to prevent anyone saying the really foolish thing that people often say about Him: I'm ready to accept Jesus as a great moral teacher, but I don't accept His claim to be God.' That is the one thing we must not say. A man who was merely a man and said the sort of things Jesus said would not be a great moral teacher. He would either be a lunatic — on a level with the man who says he is a poached egg — or else he would be the Devil of Hell. You must make your choice. Either this man was, and is, the Son of God; or else a madman or something worse. You can shut Him up for a fool, you can spit at Him and kill Him as a demon; or you can fall at His feet and call Him Lord and God. But let us not come with any patronizing nonsense about His being a great human teacher. He has not left that open to us. He did not intend to." (C.S. Lewis, Mere Christianity, p.55)

Because of the resurrection of Christ, we can rejoice alongside the Apostle Paul as he wrote that through Christ's resurrection, "Death is swallowed up in victory. ... Thanks be to God who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ!" (I Cor. 15:54b,57)

Easter as seen through the "Eye of Heaven"

What does Easter look like from the vantage point of heaven? On earth, we view Easter through the Gospel accounts of the resurrection of Christ from the grave. But what does Easter look like from the courts of heaven? In Revelation 5 the Apostle John is given an opportunity to see Easter through the eye of heaven. John has been weeping in great distress because he sees a sealed book that no one could open. John saw how our souls were locked away due to our sins, and that our doom was sealed, as no one could save us. But then, a Lamb appears. It had been slain, but was now standing, and the Lamb is introduced as the "Lion of Judah." The One who is both the Lion and the Lamb has the power by His blood to open the book and to save our souls. This Lamb sacrificed Himself for the sins of the world, and now as the Lion,

triumphs over sin, death, and the devil! This Lamb is worthy of all worship, "blessing and honor and glory and dominion forever and ever." (Rev. 5:13b) This Easter Sunday, we will read John's Gospel account of Christ's resurrection, and also hear John's vision of the resurrection of Christ through the "eye of heaven" in the book of the Revelation of Jesus Christ.

What should a church building be like?

At Peace Free Lutheran, we have a historic beautiful church building and sanctuary that was solidly built in the 1880's. It has been carefully maintained and its very structure has been a witness of Christ to the community for over 140 years! There is no "right" answer to the above question, as the building is far secondary to the substance within. There are times when we might wish we had some more modern features and spatial options, but take heart! Recently the Barna Group and Aspen Group released some research which was reported by Christianity Today (March/April 2025). They found that:

"When Americans close their eyes, they can picture a church. Even if they rarely or never attend one, they have an idea of what a church should look and feel like—and a preference. That preference is quite traditional.

Nearly 90 percent of Americans say a church should be 'easily identifiable,' and 8 of 10 say they want the building to 'reflect the beauty of God.' There are some, to be sure, who prefer that churches feel modern (38%) and trendy (28%), but most Americans want religious spaces that feel more timeless and transcendent."

With that in mind, let us be prayerful and energetic in inviting people to join us!

Graham Struesel CakeFrom the kitchen of Sandy Snoke

- 2 cups graham cracker crumbs
- ³/₄ cup chopped nuts
- ³/₄ cup brown sugar (packed)
- 1 ½ tsp cinnamon
- ³/₄ cup butter or margarine, melted

- 1 cup water
- 1 package yellow cake mix
- ½ cup vegetable oil
- 3 eggs

Vanilla Glaze

- 1 cup powdered sugar
- 1-2 tbsp water



Directions:

- 1. Heat oven to 350 degrees. Generously grease and flour a 9 x 13 pan.
- 2. Mix crumbs, nuts, brown sugar, cinnamon, and butter. Reserve.
- 3. Blend cake mix, water, oil and eggs on low speed until moistened, about 30 seconds.
- 4. Beat on medium speed, stirring occasionally, for 3 minutes.
- 5. Pour ½ batter (about 2 1/3 cups) into the pan; sprinkle with ½ of the reserved crumb mixture.
- 6. Spread the remaining batter evenly over the crumb mixture; sprinkle with remaining crumb mixture.
- 7. Bake until a wooden pick inserted in the center comes out clean, about 45 to 50 minutes. Cool.
- 8. Mix 1 cup powdered sugar and 1-2 tablespoons of water to make the glaze.
- 9. Drizzle cake with Vanilla Glaze.

Peace Free Lutheran Church turns 40 this year!

This year, 2025, is filled with significant anniversary dates, as it was 40 years ago that our congregation began. Actually, in a sense it was, "reorganized". Our congregation goes all the way back to 1829, to a small group meeting in the home of John Henry & Elizabeth Dietz who had recently arrived by covered wagon from Pennsylvania. In 1840, the congregation dedicated their first church structure and were known as "David's Congregation."

And now, fast forward to 1985......

It was on January 6, 1985, Epiphany Sunday, that the first worship service was held by those who soon formed "Peace Lutheran Church" as an independent Lutheran congregation. The group met in the Bloom Elementary school building in Lithopolis.

On January 30, 1985, Peace Lutheran Church filed corporation papers with the State of Ohio.

The first celebration of Holy Communion was on February 24, 1985, the first Sunday in Lent that year.

Beginning on April 7th, Holy Communion has been celebrated the first Sunday of each month.

The Constitution and By-Laws of Peace Lutheran Church were approved by unanimous vote of the congregation on Palm Sunday, March 31, 1985.

The first choir rehearsal was held on Wednesday, April 3rd to practice hymns for the Easter Sunday service on April 7th.

On Easter Sunday, April 7, 1985, the youth served breakfast; 115 people attended the worship service, and people could begin signing up as "charter members" until May 12th.

On April 17th a congregational potluck dinner was held in honor of Pastor Francis Smith for pastoring the congregation through these beginning months.

On Sunday, April 21st, a congregational meeting was held to discuss buying their former church building (present day Peace Free Lutheran) which had just been made available for sale for \$100,000. The Call Committee announced that it had met and recommended issuing a half-time position letter of call to Pastor Fred Klopfer. The congregation voted unanimously to do so.

We will continue each month to feature more of our congregational history. In addition, we would like to form a committee (with Bob Davis as the first volunteer) to research significant dates and suggest ways to commemorate them. Please contact the church office if you are interested in this project.

FROM THE COUNCIL

1. Pastor Carlson reported that the Lenten season services are going well, and that we continue to have visitors. He would like to see Peace reaching out more to the Pickerington area. He would also like to see a committee formed to handle research and celebration plans for our 40 year anniversary this year. Perhaps the Archives Committee can handle some of this. He continues to visit/phone/pray with 50-65 people per month. Plans for Holy Week/Easter services are complete.



- 2. The Finance Committee reported that income was a little less than expenditures last month, but the giving to missions and the building fund was up. We cashed in a \$60,000 CD. The interest will be earmarked for a disaster relief mission.
- 3. The Education Committee reported that the program for VBS will be "Wonder Junction" by Answers in Genesis. The dates are July 20-24. The committee is starting to look at Summer Sunday school plans.
- 4. The Parish Life Committee has been making plans for the Ladies' Luncheon on May 3rd at noon. Announcements will go out in the April newsletter and bulletins. There will be food and games.
- 5. The Social Concerns Committee reported that we are moving forward with the Baskets of Hope donations for CWHS. These are small toys that would go into an easter basket for kids 3-13. Also, Peace was able to raise \$2234.48 for the "bottles for life" campaign.
- 6. The Property Committee reported that the blower wheel on the boiler was replaced (thank you Sean Moneypenny!). Abbott Electric is scheduled to fix the flickering light above the piano. Also, a new garden area has been started beside the parsonage garage. The intent is to plant bushes/flowers and herbs.
- 7. The Stewardship Committee made disbursements to the CW Food Pantry, the Lancaster Food Pantry, John Pabst's medical bills, and the Chmiel Family (they serve Ukraine). Also, they will be looking for 2-3 new members, as they have lost some.
- 8. The Evangelism Committee chair discussed some of the technical needs for the Chosen People Ministries presenter, as well as how we will handle donations to them.
- 9. There was more discussion on a long term strategy for excess funds. The Committee chairs were tasked with coming up with estimates for anything they feel will be needed in the next few years, as the building and a lot of the equipment is old.
- 10. Requests for use of the PCC by 4-H were approved.


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he angel spoke to the women. He knew they were looking for Jesus. He said these words to them:


