

## "Living Together as the Church"

This summer, most of our sermons will come from the book of Acts. This book contains the account of the birth of the church on Pentecost Sunday, and ongoing life of the early church, as it is filled with the power of the promised Holy Spirit to do the missional work of Jesus Christ. The book starts where the four Gospels end, with the resurrection and ascension of Christ. Most of the rest of the books of the New Testament (Epistles) fit within the book of Acts. This book provides for us the important backstory and context of those books, and thanks to Luke, gives us a well-researched and documented account of the life of the early church as it spread out and started new

congregations. The book is filled with miracles, meals, mission trips, congregational meetings, and the experienced power of the Gospel! By the end of the first century there might well have been hundreds of thousands of believers (some estimate in the millions) as the church spread so rapidly throughout the Roman Empire, and even reaching India and beyond!

The first chapter contains the promise that the disciples will be empowered by the Holy Spirit and that commission from Jesus Himself that they are to be witnesses for Jesus, "in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria and even to the remotest part of the earth." (Acts 1:8) The book brings us on the journey of the life and mission of the church. It ends rather abruptly, with the apostle Paul in Rome, preaching the Gospel. But the "ending" is also abrupt because it is not an "ending." The book of Acts is only the beginning, of believers "Living Together as the Church" in the mission of the Church until Jesus comes again. Come, join us as we continue *"Living Together as the Church."* 

## "Summer in the Psalms"

I am excited about this series which we will be starting Sunday, June 8<sup>th</sup>, for Adult Summer Sunday School. We certainly enjoyed doing Palms Part I last summer! Several others are helping me in teaching again this year. Thank you for your requests of particular psalms. This series will include psalms of prayer, praise, petition, deliverance, protection, life, lament, repentance, thanksgiving, Messianic prophecy, and more. You will be blessed!

Martin Luther loved the book of Psalms. As a monk, he memorized all 150 of the psalms! He read and recited from them daily, to the point that his lips had "muscle memory" even of forming the very words of the psalms. Yet, even with such familiarity, they never were mechanical for him, but deeply devotional. Luther used the psalms as a basis for his prayers. He sang, taught, preached, prayed, and wrote extensively on the psalms. He used them as his "prayer book" and said that every prayer that a devoted heart would ever desire to pray, is found in the psalms.

"The church father St. Jerome [c.347-c.420 AD] says that one heard the Psalms being sung in the fields and gardens in his time. The Psalter impregnated the life of early Christianity. Yet more important than all of this is the fact that Jesus died on the cross with the words of the Psalter on His lips. Whenever the Psalter is abandoned, an incomparable treasure vanishes from the Christian Church. With its recovery will come unsuspected power." – Dietrich Bonhoffer, Psalms: The Prayerbook of the Bible

My desire for this series is that we will not just learn about the psalms, but learn to pray the psalms, and let the psalms shape our prayers.

#### FROM THE COUNCIL

1. Pastor reported that the Holy Week/Easter Sunday services were well attended and deeply meaningful. The adult Sunday School classes have included "Evidences of the Resurrection", a series on the Means of Grace, and will be starting "Summer in the Psalms". VBS adult session is in the planning stages. During the summer, he will be preaching a series on the book of Acts. A 40th Anniversary committee has been formed and will work on celebration plans.



- 2. The Finance Committee reported that although income is down some from last year, our expenditures are still running less. We will also roll over a CD for an 8 month term. The committee will be facilitating a financial audit in June.
- 3. The Parish Life Committee reported that the fellowship hour after the NDP service went well. The Ladies' Luncheon was well attended and a lot of fun! The committee will be meeting to plan the next Fifth Sunday Potluck on June 29th.
- 4. The Archives Committee worked with Sonya Poff to put together a church history document that will eventually be put in book form. Lights were installed over the Veterans Boards in the Sanctuary. Cassie Binkley will be helping by collecting and taking photos for the archives.
- 5. The Property Committee reported that the annual vent hood cleaning/inspection was done. A garden was planted and mulching done at the parsonage. Bids were received and a permit submitted for new sidewalks in front of the church.
- 6. The Stewardship Committee reported that is has begun reviewing our Peace Mission Booklet and will make updates as needed. There was discussion on the Council request that the team continue helping congregants in need all year by matching them with volunteers who can help. They have received one application for the Rase Scholarship.
- 7. The Social Concerns Committee reported that we will be participating in the CW Human Services "Tools for Schools" program. Collection will run from June 2 through August 18th. Rick Chrysler from Foundation Dinners is still there but his health is poor. The Foundation Dinners is in need of 10 oz paper bowls. PDHC is now open for tours in Lancaster.
- 8. The Youth Committee reported that the kids had fun at the last meeting with their pizza and Bible lessons. Final payment for FLY registration fees will be made the week of 5/19. Upcoming events are a rummage sale in June and three summer pool parties at the Haverfields.
- 9. The Education Committee reported that VBS plans are in the works. It will be July 20th-24th. The theme for the kid's program is Wonder Junction. Pastor Carlson will be teaching the adult sessions. Sarah Hess will

lead summer Sunday School for the kids. The Haverfield and Leitch Home Bible Studies will break during July/August.

## **Pasta Salad**

From the kitchen of Sandy Snoke

For the salad:

- For the dressing ( a pint jar works well for this): 2 cups fresh snow peas  $\frac{1}{2}$  cups green onion, sliced 2 cups broccoli flowerets  $\frac{1}{3}$  cups red wine vinegar  $2\frac{1}{2}$  cups cherry tomatoes, halved <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cups olive oil 2 cups fresh mushrooms, sliced <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cups vegetable oil 1 8 oz. package of cheese stuffed tortellini, uncooked 2 Tablespoons chopped fresh parsley 1 (6-7 oz) can whole pitted ripe 2 cloves garlic, minced black olives, drained 2 teaspoons dried basil 3 oz. fettuccine, uncooked
- 1 teaspoon dried dillweed 1 Tablespoon Parmesan cheese



1 teaspoon salt <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> teaspoon pepper <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> teaspoon sugar  $\frac{1}{2}$  teaspoon dried oregano 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> teaspoon Dijon mustard

Directions:

- 1. Boil snow peas and broccoli for 1 minute. Remove with a slotted spoon. Drain and cool.
- 2. Once cool, combine peas and broccoli with mushrooms, tomatoes, and olives in a large bowl.
- 3. Cook pasta according to package directions. Drain and let cool.
- 4. Combine vegetables, pasta, and 1 tablespoon of Parmesan cheese in a large bowl.
- 5. Add salad dressing (see directions below to make dressing) and mix well.
- 6. Chill several hours before serving. Garnish with additional Parmesan cheese.



Dressing:

Combine all listed dressing ingredients in a jar, cover tightly, and shake vigorously until well mixed. Enjoy!!


